Letter from the Executive Director

Dear Friends.

For all of us, 2021 was a year of profound challenges, growth, and reflection. For FUSE, 2021 marked a major transition from a tiny start-up towards becoming a stable and trusted organization with effective programs, a set of specific strategic goals, and a strong base of community partners. FUSE capacity has evolved to effectively change lives by providing permanent, supportive housing while also prioritizing the long-term systemic work that's necessary to expand Central Oregon supply of accessible housing.

2021 was an exhausting, and profoundly motivating year. It's still hard for me to believe that we're actually creating permanent, supportive housing opportunities that hadn't existed before. Sometimes, at the end of a long day in front of my laptop, **I'm** struck by the fact that tonight, there are already seven people who will be sleeping safe in their own apartments that night, after having experienced the trauma of homelessness for years.

For me personally, 2021 was a momentous shift from working as a 17-hour a week Program Manager while finishing grad school, to serving FUSE as the Executive Director. Like the organization itself, I'm conscious of how much there is still to learn, and how crucial solid partnerships are to be effective in this challenging work.

Throughout this Impact Report, you'll see highlights of what we've accomplished and what our community members are saying about our work. While putting this report together, I realized again how proud I am of how FUSE has evolved. I hope that someday, we will have solved the issue of homelessness and there won't be a need for FUSE. Until that day though, I'm committed to work creatively and collaboratively to build bridges into permanent housing.

Every night, there are **over 200 people** who have disabilities or complex health care needs sleeping outside in Central Oregon.

FUSE is changing that.

Chronic homelessness is a complex issue that requires a holistic and strategic response. Here's what FUSE is doing:

Permanent, Supportive Housing (PSH)



we're creating permanent, affordable housing with supportive services, so that our most vulnerable community members can exit homelessness for good.

Mosaic Medical was one of the partners that helped found FUSE in 2018. We have long recognized that it is critical for our patients and for our larger community that Central Oregonians have access to stable housing with supportive services. Supporting the FUSE mission is aligned with Mosaic's goal of improving social determinants of health, and we value being a partner in creating this critical resource in Central Oregon. 99

FUSE is meeting a well-known, critical gap in our region.

- Without low-barrier, supportive housing in Central Oregon, there are almost no options for the most vulnerable individuals to exit homelessness.
- Permanent Supportive Housing (PSH) is a data-backed, evidencebased model, and according to USICH, is credited with reducing chronic homelessness by 20% in the US.
- PSH can actually **save the community money in the long run**, by reducing costs to health care and crisis services.

We're accomplishing our mission through three primary projects:

- 1. Neighborhood-Based Housing Program, our scattered-site PSH Program
- 2. Cleveland Commons development project
- 3. Systemic advocacy & community education

I thought I had it all together. I was self-sufficient. I was always been a hard worker, and I've worked some tough jobs, though maybe I should have done stuff that wasn't so hard on my body. We used to have this small RV that was a lot of fun for weekend trips with the kids and my ex wife. After I got hurt, and our family split up, me **living in the RV was supposed to be temporary**.

It's been about six years now, and the RV is a lot less fun than it was back on our trips. **I honestly can't believe that I'm in this position of needing help.** I broke down crying the first time I went in the food stamp office, thinking "this isn't me." Getting help from a nonprofit still doesn't feel like me, but I'm stuck. My Social Security Disability check isn't enough to get back into housing. My body is hurting more every day.

I really didn't see a way out of this for a long time, until I met you folks. 🔊


FUSE 2021 Impacts



We developed our Neighborhood-Based Housing Program, a new PSH program that has already <u>ended homelessness</u> for seven vulnerable individuals.

We are creatively leveraging funding sources to provide **in-home support services** while **subsidizing local housing units for our most at-risk community members.**

Our Neighborhood-Based Housing Program provides housing navigation, move-in assistance, and landlord incentives to **minimize barriers to stable housing.**



FUSE works with REACH to provide Housing Retention support, ensuring that each of our participants have individualized, trauma-informed support, connections to healthcare, collaborative goal setting, and the resources they need to thrive.

This work would not be possible without our partners, especially **REACH**, **Deschutes County Behavioral Health**, and **EPIC Property Management**.

PROGRAM DETAILS

• FUSE keeps housing stable by subsidizing rent and utility expenses with a HUD Continuum of Care grant, which lets **our participants pay just 30% of their income for housing.**

• To comply with federal funding mandates as **we build Central Oregon's** <u>first</u> **Permanent Supportive Housing program that serves non-veterans**, we have developed extensive program policies, documentation systems, detailed financial tracking mechanisms, and a comprehensive participant assessment tool. As required by HUD, referrals to FUSE come exclusively through the regional Coordinated Entry System, and FUSE utilizes HMIS for participant records.

• **Referral Information**: Adults in Central Oregon who are chronically homeless and currently experiencing literal homelessness can complete a Coordinated Entry System assessment through the <u>Homeless Leadership Coalition</u>. Individuals who meet those basic eligibility requirements and whose assessment indicates that they are highly vulnerable will be referred to FUSE. <u>Unfortunately, FUSE program capacity is severely limited</u> due to funding constraints, and at time of publishing, FUSE does not anticipate having additional housing slots available before the end of 2022. We are working hard to expand capacity to meet the overwhelming need for affordable, supported housing. Please reach out to csinsky@centraloregonfuse.org if you have questions.

• FUSE also **enabled an additional** <u>three</u> chronically homeless households to move off the streets and into permanent housing by paying their move-in expenses.

• For individuals who have been living outside, **moving past survival mode means having individualized**, **holistic support**. FUSE works to make sure that we have <u>flexible funding</u> available to meet needs that **improve health**, **housing stability**, **and dignity**.





FUSE provides a critical and unique opportunity for individuals to move from houselessness to permanent housing. Through our partnership with FUSE, REACH has partnered with some of our most vulnerable community members. The stability and support provides people an opportunity to move to greater independence and self sufficiency. 99



FUSE is a strategic partner helping plan Central Oregon's first Permanent Supportive Housing development, coming to Bend in 2024.

FUSE helped lead a team of local agencies that was selected to participate in the 2020-2021
Oregon Permanent Supportive Housing Institute. This means that Central Oregon's first PSH
development will have priority access to capital financing and services
funding through Oregon Housing and Community Services and the Oregon Health Authority.

 We're working with our partners, Housing Works, NeighborImpact, EPIC Property Management, and Deschutes County Behavioral Health to strategize operations and plan services and stable funding for the 33-unit PSH development, "Cleveland Commons" coming to SE Bend in 2024.

• FUSE has contracted with two researchers to explore and report on how similar, already established PSH communities in Oregon have braided funding sources and established operations. Learning and implementing best practices is a critical aspect of our mission.

 We're building new partnerships, giving presentations, and creating reports to share with local government entities and community groups to provide education on solutions to chronic homelessness.

We're working towards centering lived experience to inform our program design.

- FUSE is developing a paid supportive employment "internship" for an individual with a recent lived experience of homelessness. We want to create opportunities for members of the community we serve to have a meaningful influence on how FUSE evolves, while building a pathway towards a career in our field.
- We administer an adapted "Social Determinants of Health Assessment" to track participant outcomes in various SDOH arenas, solicit participant feedback about the program, and **collaboratively develop a case plan based on each individual's goals.**
- We extended a flexible, part-time contract with paid training, transportation assistance, and an above-market hourly wage to an individual who's lived experience includes homelessness to work as our Administrative Support Specialist. (And she's been awesome!)

FUSE hired Colleen Sinsky as the full-time Executive Director in August 2021.

• Colleen has spent over a decade working on homelessness and affordable housing in Oregon. Previously, she had supported FUSE as a part-time contracted Program Manager, and as a Master of Social Work student intern. Hiring Colleen as the Executive Director ensures that **FUSE has permanent, professional staff driving the mission.**



FUSE was awarded an incredible \$483,273 in grants to further our work and the work of our partners over the next few years.

• While we rely on these grants, most of what we've raised will be passed through to our partners or used to pay rent for our participants. Looking ahead, FUSE will work on securing funding to build organizational capacity and hire program staff.

• We are so grateful to our funders for partnering with us to end chronic homelessness in Central Oregon. Our work is not possible without their investments.





In Their Own Words

"After eight years of living out in the dirt, having this place feels like heaven to us. Life was hard out there. Hard on our bodies and hard on our relationship with each other. Both of us were suffering from some health issues: diabetes, heart issues, difficulty walking around, you name it. I felt like I'd worked too hard my whole life to end up out there.

I'd been a millworker for 25 years until the mills shut down and we started to lose everything. First the paycheck and the health insurance, then unemployment, and finally our house. We didn't really know how to get out of that situation- being stuck out in the dirt and cold. Meeting all of you [Mosaic Medical, Deschutes County Behavioral Health, REACH, and FUSE] has been a real godsend. "From here, our biggest goal is to be able to spend at least a few more Christmases together."

We still can't believe how incredible this apartment is and how blessed we are.

We got to have our grandkids visit for Thanksgiving, and we put up our first Christmas tree in eight years! Our relationship with each other is getting better and better without all of that stress, and we're actually making it it to our doctors appointments now! From here, our biggest goal is to be able to spend at least a few more Christmases together."
